AND <u>GUESS</u> <u>WHO</u> WAS GUIDING HER THE WHOLE TIME?







They started telling the lie that Nimrod's soul had "migrated" from his dead body into Semiramis' womb, so the baby was supposedly Nimrod—and a god, too!




So in the next generations¹, Semiramis became the focus of their religion, not Nimrod—or her son.

Semiramis and her baby Nimrod (or "Tammuz" - which means "faithful son" 1) had nowhere near the power that her husband Nimrod had displayed. They couldn't protect the people from wild beasts—or even rival cities! Semiramis needed another way to control the Babylonians. The only way to do this was to seal them in, building towers and walls around Babylon.²



Now she and her baby (who was supposedly "Nimrod" reincarnated) could rule over the people more completely. But that wasn't enough for the Devil and Semiramis. She wanted to control their very thoughts, as well.

SEMIRAMIS NEEDED <u>SOMEONE</u> TO BECOME HER EYES AND EARS AROUND BABYLON...



SO QUEEN SEMIRAMIS INVENTED ... HER OWN PRIESTHOOD! 1




THEN AN ORDINARY EVENT GAVE SEMIRAMIS A SNEAKY WAY TO CONTROL THE PEOPLE...



Confessional booths1 started popping up around Babylon.









Sunlight flashes through the hole, lighting the chamber.





The men move "Nimrod" into position before the hole...

Like magic, a right side-up image of the idol of Nimrod projects onto the wall. It's a very old trick,¹ but it works!






Satan replaced faith in God with religion and parlor tricks. Now he had to make a god out of Tammuz.

Tammuz was born into a very confusing world. His mother's husband (killed by Shem) was not his father. Nimrod was already known by many different names, like Marduk and Gilgamesh. And Tammuz (Semiramis' son, said to be Nimrod reincarnated), was supposed to be Semiramis' husband as well as her son! What a mess!



¹ Because God confounded the language, the members of this strange family got even more names. (See Chapter 3.) Marduk is just a different spelling of Nimrod. In Hebrew, the root word MRD ("to rebel") adds an N at the front. But in Babylonian they added a K at the end. So N+MRD became MRD+K.

Inanna was a name for Semiramis used by people in Sumer (south of Babylon).

Here's what ancient myths² have in common: They all say spirits came to Inanna (Semiramis) to drag her down to hell...




She **refused** to tell them where to find Tammuz, till one day..



By the time they were finished with him, Tammuz ended up looking *nothing like* his real self.



Now Tammuz was not only a god—he was <u>beautiful</u>. Satan was almost ready to *export* Babylon Religion.

There were a few more changes in store, Queen Semiramis used her power to make final adjustments so that her "priesthood" would live on after her death.



Ancient stories say that Semiramis was the most beautiful woman in the world. An often-quoted passage seems to describe the historical evidence beautifully:

She was beautiful no doubt Her form was matchless in symmetry, so that her every gesture, in the saddle or on the throne, was womanly, dignified, and graceful, while each dress she wore, ... seemed that in which she looked her best. ... she possessed more than a man's power of mind and force of will.

A shrewd observer would have detected in those bright eyes, despite their ... loving glance, the genius that can command an army and found an empire ... in the clean-cut jaw and prominence of the beautifully moulded chin, a cold recklessness that could harden on occasion to pitiless cruelty ¹

After the death of Nimrod, Semiramis was in mourning—but

also in danger! So she quickly took her Babylon Religion underground.

But she also became pregnant! So Satan helped her devise a way to claim her baby was really Nimrod reincarnated. Amazingly, the people bought it.





Everyone believed that her child was the promised "seed" of Eve who would defeat Satan, and thus "bruise the serpent's head" (Genesis 3:15).
